

This year, the infamous Malmo Halloween House celebrates 10 years haunting the neighbourhood, bringing Halloween spirit and horrorific delights.

To mark the occasion, Mike and Kelsey Kendrick, owners and resident haunters of the home, have put together a spine-tingling array of yard displays inspired by they most classic — dare they say, *Universal* — of monster movies.

On October 26, Edmonton will be site at 4712 Malmo Road NW to feature the haunt, with Community along League representatives and neighbours-at-large, sharing what makes Malmo Plains such a great place to live. Committee formed to address community safety concerns

n September 21, 2022, the Malmo Community League hosted a Community Safety Conversation.

Approximately 35 residents attended. Updates were provided to the attendees on the concerns surrounding the LRT station. Concerns from residents continued to be expressed. Equally, there were residents who expressed the LRT as a community asset and the importance of the LRT in their lives.

As such, a small group of residents

stepped forward to be a committee who will explore ways to animate the alley access point to be more inviting, while at the same time deterring unwelcome behaviour through the principles of Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED).

Little Library opens on Malmo Road

ookworms take note! Malmo Plains is now home to a Little Free Library at 4712 Malmo Road.

Little Free Libraries are small public boxes offering free access to books to anyone passing by, encouraging literacy and community building. Following a "Take a Book, Leave a Book" philosophy, library patrons are encouraged to help themselves to a new read, or contribute

books to pass along to others.

Malmo's newest library is maintained by Mike and Kelsey Kendrick. The design is inspired by old mining towns, borrowing styles from some of their favourite theme park attractions, and houses both children's and grown-ups sections.

The Little Free Library (LFL) project is a non-profit based in St. Paul, MN, but has branches all around the world. LFL's mission is to increase access to books for everyone, especially in underserved and under-privileged areas. They also strive to make books available representing BIPOC, LGBTQ+, and other diverse voices to promote understanding, empathy, and inclusion.

Michener Park update from U of A

emolition of Michener Park's Vanier Tower began last month, and will continue through the fall with an anticipated completion by late November 2022. The building is being taken down floor by floor to minimize noise, debris, and disturbances to nearby residents.

University of Alberta Properties, Inc. (UAPTI) has begun grading the site. Stage 1 of the grading will continue through the fall and Stage 2 will begin in spring 2023 followed by utilities installation and road construction.

UAPTI representatives will continue to meet with South Campus Neighbourhood Coalition (SCNC) representatives on a regular basis to review development plans for the MP site.

University representatives remind anyone nearby to please keep a significant safe distance from the site while demolition teams work, and to obey all posted signage.
